POINT LOMA LIGHTHOUSE HOLIDAY DECORATIONS 2021

The Point Loma Garden Club, working in collaboration with staff at Cabrillo National Monument, has provided holiday decorations for the Point Loma Lighthouse for more than 50 years. In 2020, the Lighthouse was closed to the public, but we still decorated with red berry wreaths hung in the four front windows.

In 2021 the Lighthouse reopened, and we were able to decorate inside. In addition to the wreaths from last year, the red and green wrapped packages and the antique doll from many prior years were put in service. The new feature was two garlands, made of crochet snowflakes, which were hung in the windows of the Living Room and Kitchen display enclosures.

When I was thinking up what to do for this year, I discovered a box of crochet snowflakes in my mother's stash of holiday decorations, which I had inherited. I don't know for sure, but I believe that the snowflakes were created by long-ago garden club members.
