## HORTICULTURAL TABLE

In the September Issue of the PLGC Newsletter Dale Rekus, President 2006 said:

"We are going to try something new this year...strut your stuff and bring in a Horticultural Specimen (or three) from your perennial flower border, vegetable garden or native plant area for our newly instituted monthly event. It can be a single annual bloom or even an attractive tree branch. As long as you grew it and want to show it off, bring it to the meeting...entries will not be judged as in a flower show but displayed simply for the enjoyment by and the education of our fellow members...we will provide 3"x5" cards for you to identify your plant and yourself".

After attending several other PLGC meetings and events, Jim Tullar became an official garden club member in November of 2013 and as they say: The rest is history! This 2022-2023 season at the Table has been the best one yet. We had 34 members bring in a total of 52 specimens. At our May meeting Colleen Casey created a beautiful bouquet of lavender Tree Mallow (Lavatera maritina) for us to admire along with some yellow Rue (Ruta graveolens) flowers. She also displayed a whimsical "coastal design "arrangement. Judy Pack showed us her sweet peas, a geranium and some oregano. Also Shyla Crowson overwhelmed us with a pink rose, a yellow rose, a white daisy, a red and white geranium, some guava flowers and a Bahl wisteria. Finally, Bob Pels brought in a blooming Aloe maculata and a yellow and red orchid. Special thanks to Bob for stepping in to help with the Table in my absence in May and for the several other times when I was recovering and could not attend. is my final newsletter article and my final season at the Horticultural Table. Thank you everyone who brought in their beautiful specimens over the years and those who just came by to look and learn what other members have in their gardens. In addition to having fun, learning a lot, seeing so much beauty and meeting so many members, it was a great excuse to eat quite a variety of candy! Look for a Fuentes avocado, Black Mission and Golden fig, Oro Blanco grapefruit, Bearrs lime, navel orange, Meyer lemon, Nordman kumquat, Edulis passion fruit vine, and a vanilla banana.

I've also tried to incorporate more drought tolerant plants using agaves, aloes, bromeliads, tillandsias, and succulents among others. Like many of you plant collectors, I started planting in "drifts of one!" But as they matured and pupped, the plants filled in.

I also garden with possum, raccoons, and skunks. They are a challenge, but I have a new strategy to deter them. See if you can discover it. Please enter the garden from a side gate off of Carlton Street. There are a few steps and the garden is terraced. I'll have libations and a charcuterie cheese spread. You are welcome to bring nibblies but it's not necessary.
